Working with Children Check Exemption Information

NSW

If not a NSW resident, but holds a WWCC of home state/territory, can work for up to 30 days in a 12 month calendar period.

A person is exempt if they are "A visiting speaker, adjudicator, performer, assessor or other similar visitor at a school or other place where child-related work is carried out if the work of the person at that place is for a one off occasion and is carried out in the presence of one or more other adults."

If not a VIC resident, but holds a WWCC of home state/territory, can work for up to 30 days in a 12 month calendar period.
